Last fall, Wayne and I were so lucky to be able to join a tour group and visit Ecuador, to see the Galapagos Islands and experience the wildlife, straddle the Equator, climb the Andes and soak in a geothermal hot spring, and canoe the Napo River in the Amazon. It was truly magical! We also thoroughly enjoyed the wonderful food and hospitality that we found everywhere we went, as we learned about the history of the country and visited the heritage sites.



We had an opportunity to enjoy 'glamping' at the Sacha Lodge in the Amazon and the Scalesia Lodge on Isabella Island in the Galapagos. Both were beautiful, well-appointed and provided a wonderful base camp for our day and evening excursions. Daniel was our knowledgeable Gate1 tour leader who saw to everyone's needs and brought on guides specific to the locale we were in, naturalists or historians or both. They shared their stories, asked us questions and engaged us. Daniel too was incredibly knowledgeable and took the time to share his knowledge. One memorable time was stopping the bus on the Pan-American highway so we all could experience the many fruits Ecuador has to offer. Not one horn was beeped, not one angry shout was heard, as our bus blocked the right lane of the Pan-American highway as we sampled the fruits. Very hospitable people to say



the least.

Another amazing experience was snorkeling in the Galapagos with the sea lions, sea turtles, many species of fish, and white tipped sharks. The water was about 60 degrees but our wet suits and our wonder kept us warm. My favorite adventures of the trip were those in the Amazon, in a canoe paddled by an indigenous man from the Quichua community. We were silent as we slid through narrow passageways, surrounded on all sides by green vines and lush forest growth, spotting colorful birds

and troupes of monkeys clamoring about above us! It was so unique and truly unforgettable.



Since I have been learning Spanish on the Duolingo app for several years, I also thoroughly enjoyed any and all interactions with the Ecuadorian people, who were super kind and patient with my attempts to communicate. I would start speaking in Spanish (Por favor...) and they would begin to smile, listen carefully, and then

respond in Spanish, graciously speaking slowly

and still smiling. It was SO fun!

We also enjoyed meeting fellow travelers with whom we shared the wonder and awe of Ecuador. For the two weeks, our tour guide called us 'my family' and it truly felt like that at the end of the tour! We felt fortunate, indeed, to be able to have this once in a lifetime adventure.

Notes from the Session:

The Session met on January 19, 2023 at 6 pm. Present were Rev. Holly Clark-Porter, Audrey Divine, Janine Scaccia, Susan Pepe, Cori Coia (Cori will not be a voting member until the congregation votes on her position at the February congregational meeting. She was invited to attend to help her become familiar with the Session members and the responsibilities of the Session.). Betsy Sly was excused.

The meeting was opened with prayer and guest, Mark Armesto, was welcomed. Holly excused herself as Mark was sent from the Presbytery (he is our liaison to the Presbytery) to discuss with the Session how we felt Holly's first year at Fredonia Presbyterian went. His questions resulted in a lengthly, 40 minute discussion. Fair to say her approval rating was high.

With Mark's departure Holly returned for the regular meeting.

- Lengthy discussion of the church finances; our budget deficit, the 2023 budget, and Holly's terms of call. Approved Holly's terms of call for 2023.
- Holly has begun a Bible Study at Fredonia Place. It was well attended and to quote Holly, "It looks like it is going to be a good thing."
- Another person has expressed interest in becoming a member.
- A full slate of officers will be presented for the congregations' vote at the annual meeting.
- A Session retreat has been planned for February.
- It was not what had been planned for the Christmas Eve service but all agreed it was lovely. Thanks were expressed for everyone who sent in videos and pictures for the "lighting of the candles". Discussed how the Deacon's phone calls and the computer notifications worked to notify people that the Christmas services had been cancelled.
- Holly is finding the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry is keeping her busy. (She is attending Session meetings in three different churches for the next couple of months.)
- Looking toward the future Holly has made some technology changes. Moving our website to Wix is one; planning for "digital disciples" is another.
- January 4-7 Holly traveled to Washington, DC to attend the ecumenical Q Conference with others from the Presbytery.
- Holly has lined up a babysitter for the nursery which will start in February. Besides the hired sitter, another adult needs to be in the nursery. We're hoping that folks will volunteer.
- Voted to serve communion on all the 1st Sundays of the month in 2023 and at special services; Ash Wednesday and Easter.
- Collection of under wear and warm winter clothing went well. Food Pantry is going well.
- Our congregation will be a Church World Service Depot again this year. The dates are March 12 through April 2 (Palm Sunday). We will again do Hygiene Kits.

The next meeting will be the Session Retreat on Saturday, February 25.

The meeting was adjourned with prayer.
