From Our Pastor

I've become friends with a handful of Chinese people. So, I thought I'd try my hand at learning the language! I'm good at languages, right? I've learned new characters like Greek and learned to read right to left like Hebrew. I got this.

NOPE. Before you even learn the letters, there are four tones that you need to learn to express. I got stuck on page one and gave up.

But, I might have to pick it up again after reading an article on people who learn languages. I was just telling friends that one reason I love languages is that you start to understand whole cultures better because you know the very-different-from-English sentence structure of Spanish or Russian or Farsi and you begin to understand the odd lilts or bizarre phrasing. Like, my college roommate from Mexico who spoke beautiful English but who always said, "For why?" Instead of just "Why?" It's because the literal translation from Spanish to English is two words, "por que" literally, "for why."

I didn't know the half of it though until I read this article.

"Research shows," it says, "people who speak another language are more utilitarian and flexible, less risk averse and egotistical, and better able to cope with traumatic memories." Crazy, awesome. It goes on to talk about how knowing more than one language asks your brain to be more creative and make quick decisions, like "Should I say amarillo or yellow?"

When someone was describing their fears in their second or third language, they were able to calm their fears quicker and more successfully. People with two or more languages also were able to handle ambiguity and change because their minds have already learned how to handle it while speaking. If you've learned another language, that also means you've reached beyond what you know and either have chosen or been put into different cultures, which of course broadens the way you think.

It's a long article and I've not done it justice. (check it out on The Guardian: Language by David Robson) But in the end, my theological ears heard that learning others makes you a better person. It feels a lot like Gospel. Even if we don't know por que, we know that there's magic in meeting people where they are. It's what Jesus does in Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. And it's what God did in bushes and waters and wind and doves. So, what will you 學習 and estudiar and amour more.

When the opposing team drove up, only six players exited their van. The coach explained that three of his players were unable to make the trip. I was faced with a major moral and philosophical decision.

Do I play only my starters to have a chance to win the match or do I play the seniors and perhaps not win the match? As coach, it seemed that whatever decision I made, someone would lose, the team or the seniors.

I turned my eyes skyward and said a quick prayer to the Great Coach above. I needed an answer and I needed it now. I had not noticed that three of the starters were standing before me. They had decided to give up their spots to the seniors. I was over-whelmed with their generous gesture. I agreed. The seniors were excited to play and their parents were thrilled to watch their daughters perform. I felt that it was the right decision, regardless of the outcome of the match.

The seniors won their sets and the team won the match. It proved that our team motto is more than words; it is the spirit of the team. It was a perfect ending to a perfect day.
