BE KINDBy Joe Calarco

While in Florida, I am a Mentor for 25 fifth grade boys. We met once a week and have "lessons" on life skills such as character, service, respect, responsibility, honesty, fairness, and citizenship. At the end of the 12-week program, we celebrated with a graduation. Each boy spoke on the one "lesson-trait" that meant the most to him. The #1 trait that influenced them was...KINDNESS! (note: this was not one of the official lessons). They felt that Kindness was the basis of all the other traits. and had the greatest effect on their lives.

Destiny Houston from WNY was selected as the "Kindest Kid in America." She defined Kindness as "being kind to others when no one else is watching." In the article, "Always Be Kind" Donna Volmerding, 77, offers words of wisdom to the next generation. "Always be kind, even if you don't feel like it. Some of the biggest regrets I have in my life are times when I was unkind. Be honest, but temper everything with kindness."

Once I was the recipient of an unusual act of kindness. As a young teacher, I taught at Fredonia High School but lived in Dunkirk. To supplement my income, I taught English at Dunkirk Summer School. It was a sweltry summer, and my 30 students suffered through the heat while reading Romeo and Juliet. They were a rough and rowdy group and would prefer to be outside of a hot classroom, rather than trying to understand Shakespeare. We had a tenuous relationship. They let me teach and I did not hassle them. On the last day of class. I told them that I would release them early to enjoy the rest of their summer, and that I was moving today from Dunkirk to Fredonia. As I lived 2 blocks from school, I walked home, thinking of the arduous day ahead of me, moving 23 large boxes with all our belongings. It would take at least 7 or 8 car trips of loading and unloading. Fifteen minutes later, I arrived home to a surprise. All the moving boxes were gone. My wife said, "Your students took them in pickup trucks." "Oh, no!" I moaned, "they don't know where our new house is." I thought that it must be a last day joke on the teacher. We drove to the house and there were no boxes in the garage. When we entered the house, I could not believe what I saw. We found all the labeled boxes in the appropriate rooms. I never saw the students again. But I remember their unconditional act of kindness.

Presbyterian minister, child advocate and creator of his "Neighborhood," Mr. Rogers stated: "There are three ways to ultimate success. The first way is to be kind. The second way is to be kind. The third way is to be kind."

I believe that Jesus would agree with Tim McGraw's lyrics, "Always stay humble and kind."

The 2025 six month report is in from CWS. Already this year they have provided folks with 27,847 kits and blankets. That includes 12,720 hygiene kits and 6,610 blankets.

From Tiffany DeTienne who works on the Congregations Team at CWS: "So far this year, thanks to your partnership and compassion, CWS kits have been shared from Grand Rapids to Chicago, Dallas to Cleveland, and Annapolis to Poughkeepsie—reaching neighbors in family resource centers, warming shelters, soup kitchens, refugee welcome centers and communities facing tough times.

This winter, CWS placed a crucial role in California's wildfire recovery by helping establish the Wildfire Resource Hub, which provided a wide array of services—from emergency aid to long-term recovery support. CWS Kits were a part of that response."


